#### **Focus On Standards**

This School Status and Improvement Report has been prepared as part of the Department's education accountability system to provide regular, understandable accounts of our schools' performance and progress, as required by §302A-1004, Hawai'i Revised Statutes.

This report describes the school and its setting; provides information about the school's administrators, teachers, students and facilities; summarizes progress made based on the school's improvement plan, and reports student achievement results along with other vital signs.

#### **School Description**

Makaha Elementary School opened in 1960 and is located in a rural community in the Waianae district. Five public elementary schools, Waianae Intermediate School, and Waianae High School form the Waianae Complex. Makaha Elementary School selected the America's Choice School Design (ACSD) reform model in March 2001. Standards are the driving force behind instruction, assessment, and professional development. We are proud of our successful inclusion program that benefits students who receive Special Education services in the regular education classroom setting.

Makaha Elementary School collaborates with Hoa 'Aina O Makaha, who shares a common border with the school. Its Hawaiiana and environmental studies provide students with an opportunity to apply concepts learned in the classroom. Makaha Elementary's Positive Behavior program works toward engaging students in a variety of physical and academic standards-based activities. Students practice general learner outcomes and earn a "Mega Recess" upon completion of assigned tasks.



### **School Improvement**

### **Summary of Progress**

Based on input gathered from school faculty/committee meetings and the school community council and community forums, Makaha Elementary School will continue to refine the goals, strategic actions and enabling activities previously identified in the Makaha Elementary School strategic and academic plans. Heavy emphasis is placed on implementing a professional development plan which addresses benchmarks and standards, and the continued consistent practice of analyzing student data to drive instruction.

Makaha Elementary will continue to use the workshop model to implement a reader's workshop, writer's workshop, math workshop, and skills block within each classroom. Makaha will also focus schoolwide improvement efforts on the five components that make-up the America's Choice School Design: standards and assessment, aligned instructional system, professional learning communities, parent and community involvement and high performance management. Focus areas for improvement (in school year 2008-09) will be identified using these five design components as a guide in the selection and monitoring of schoolwide targets and activities.

Makaha Elementary school made AYP last school year, and is hopeful that despite the transiency of the student population (only 25% of the graduating sixth graders entered Makaha as kindergarteners), their school improvement efforts will positively affect student achievement.






